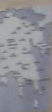

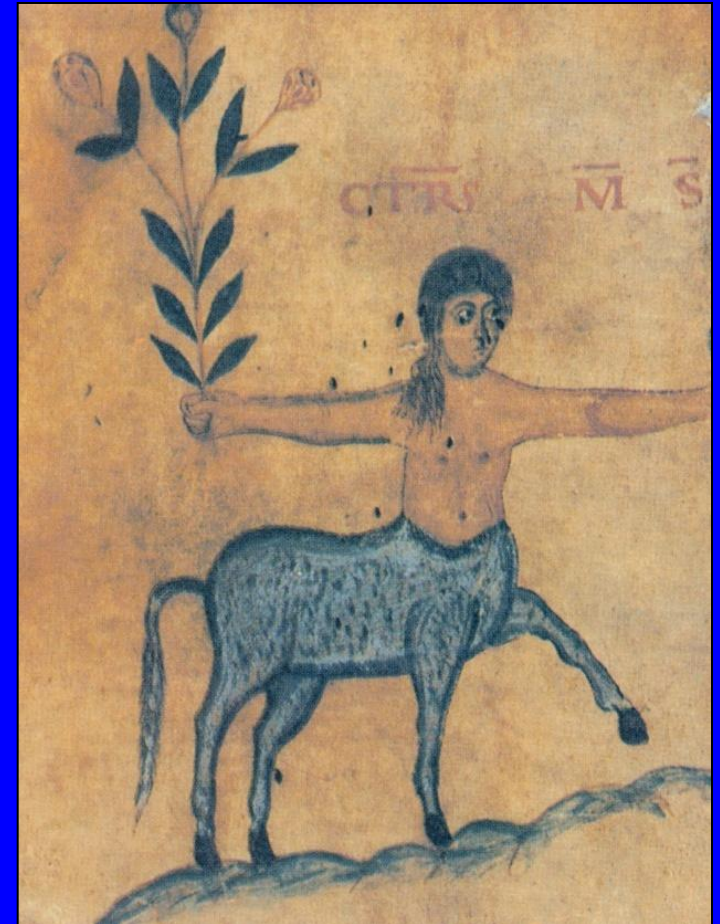

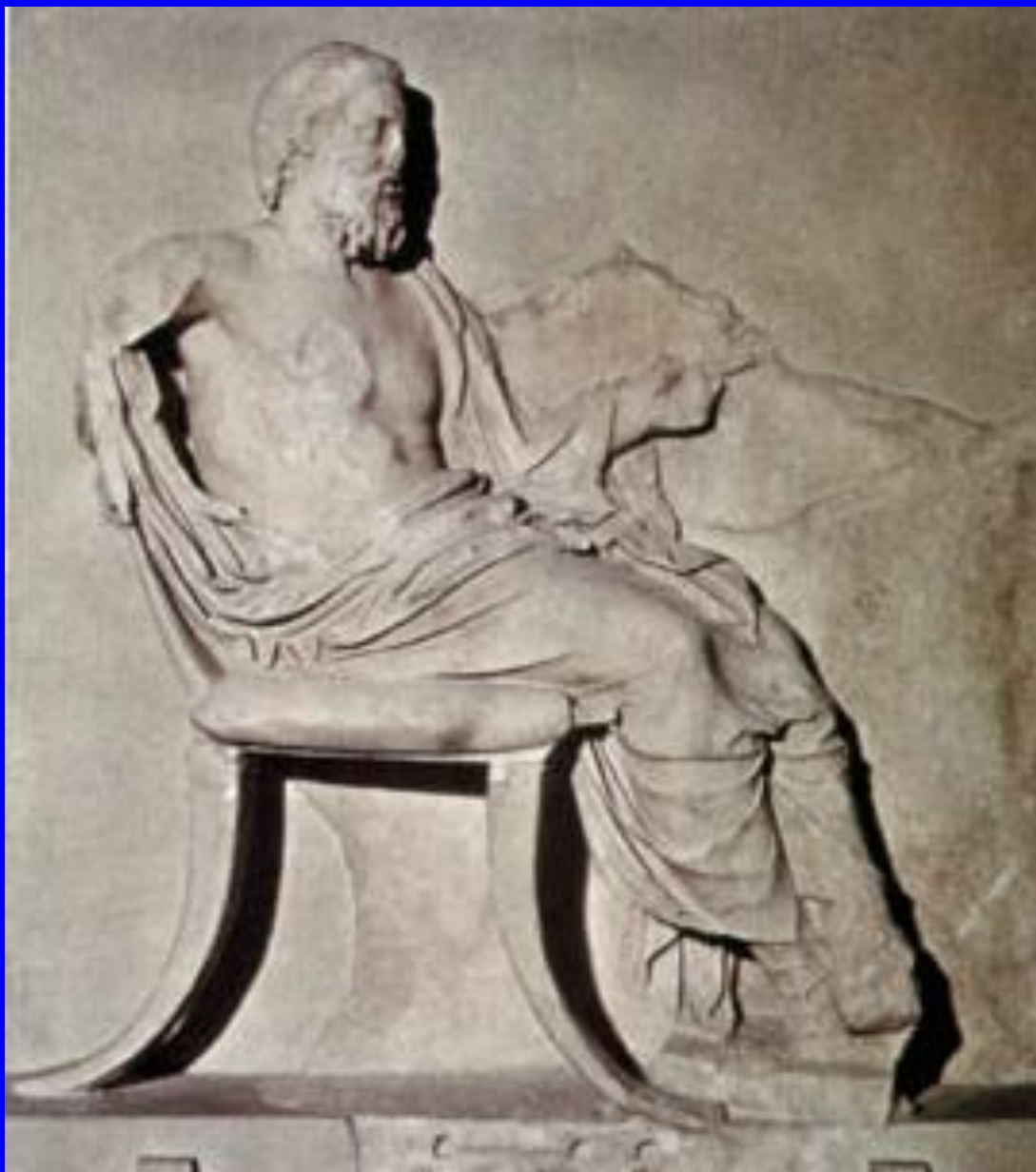

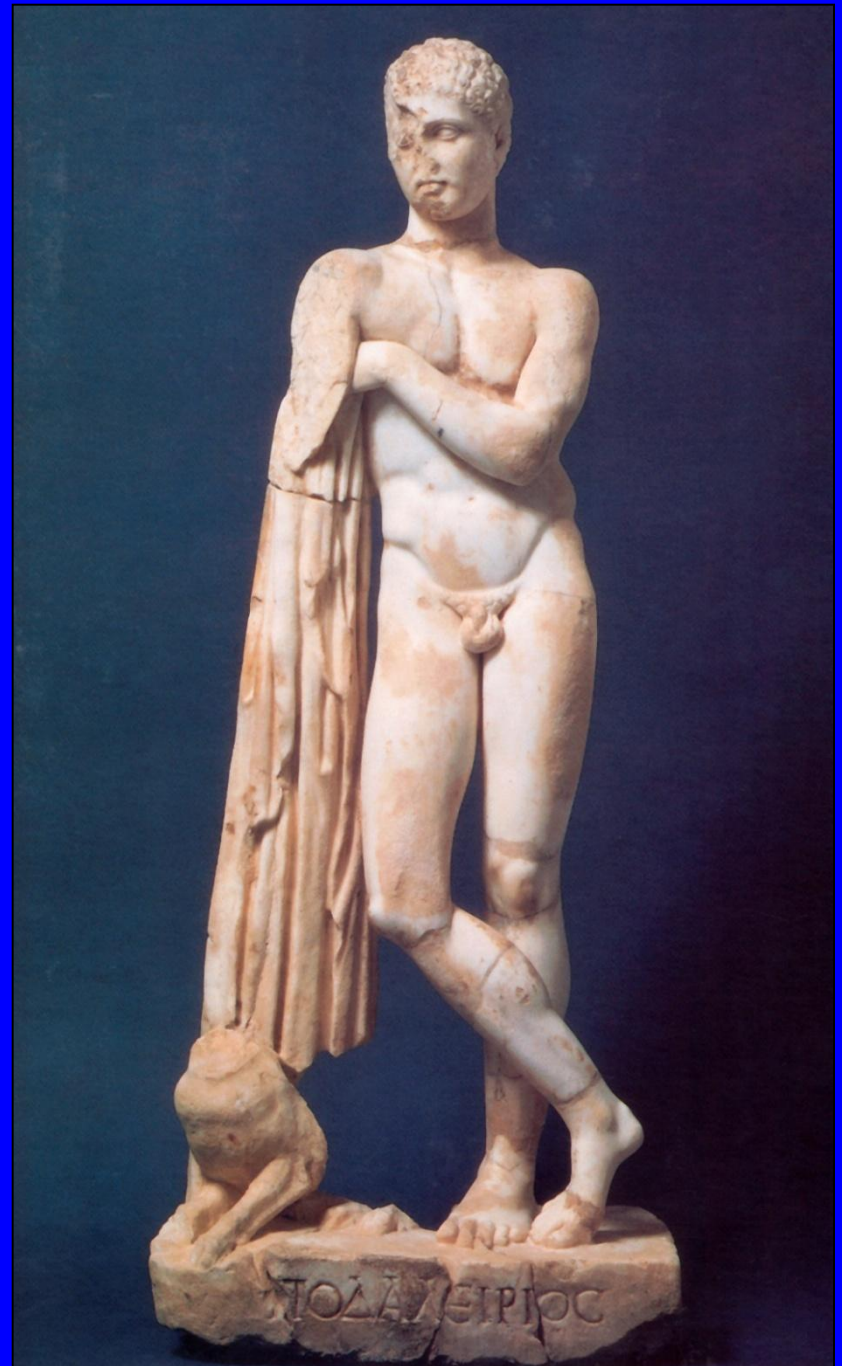

ASKLEPIEION OF EPIDAUROS
The Main Healing Place of Antiquity

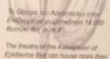


"Asklepieia" were the healing temples of Asklepios, they originated around the 6th century B.C. The most famous ones were the Asklepieia of Tricase in Theriasty, of Epidaurus on Peloponnesos, of Kos and Pergamon. However, more than 400 are still known today in the Mediterranean area.

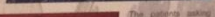
The Asklepeion of Epidauros was in Antiquity the biggest and most famous one in Greece. It comprised a huge complex of buildings including temples dedicated to Asklepios, Hygieia, Apollo and other gods. Next to these temples a huge building with at least 320-480 beds, probably a housing for the sick, was erected.

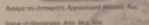
Next to the temples was the «abaton» the incubation site, where patients would go to sleep until the god would visit them in their dream and tell them how they could cure their disease. A stadium, a hippodrome, a small odeon, a library, baths, restaurants and a big theatre for 14,000 spectators, surrounded the temples, the hospice and the abaton.

The patients asking for help would follow a specific ceremony. The ritual would start after sundown and was surrounded by rituals which together with the magnificent buildings, statues and the natural setting, put the patient into a mental state receptive to the healing ministrations. Prior abstinence from specific foods and wine, clean white robe was worn. Agit or sacrifice was required. This could be followed by a period of abstinence. All the patients were given a tablet daily containing a small amount of opium. During the night, the patients were given a small amount of opium. 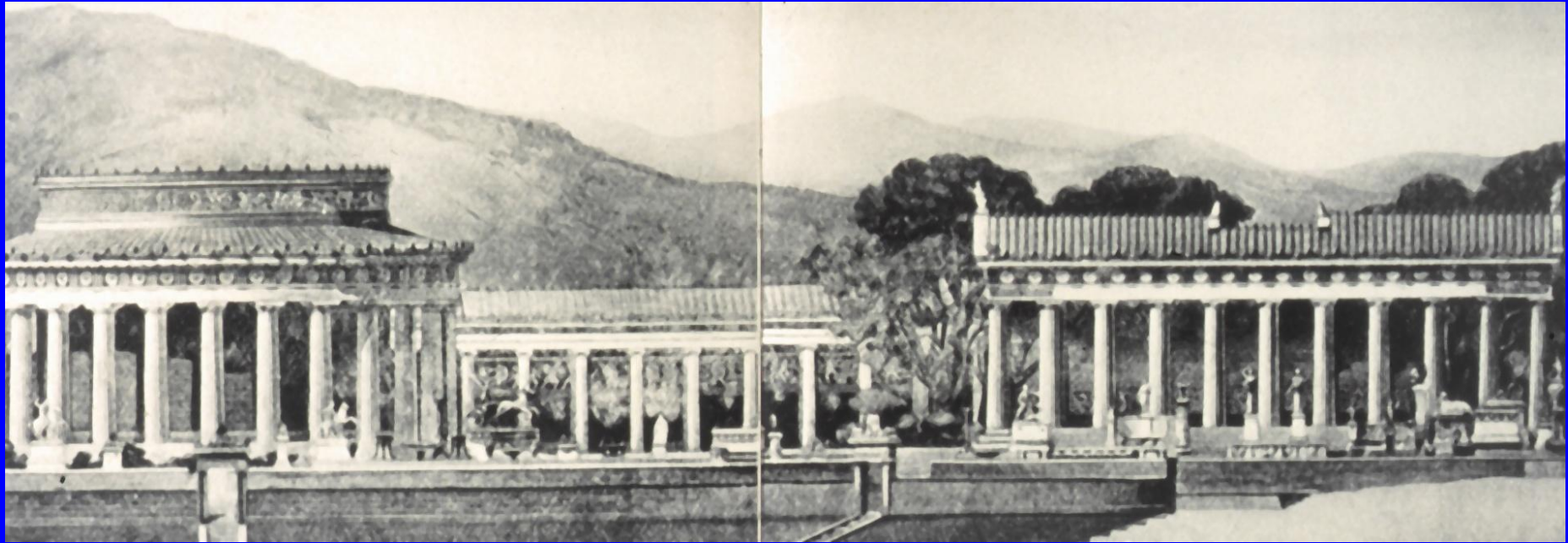

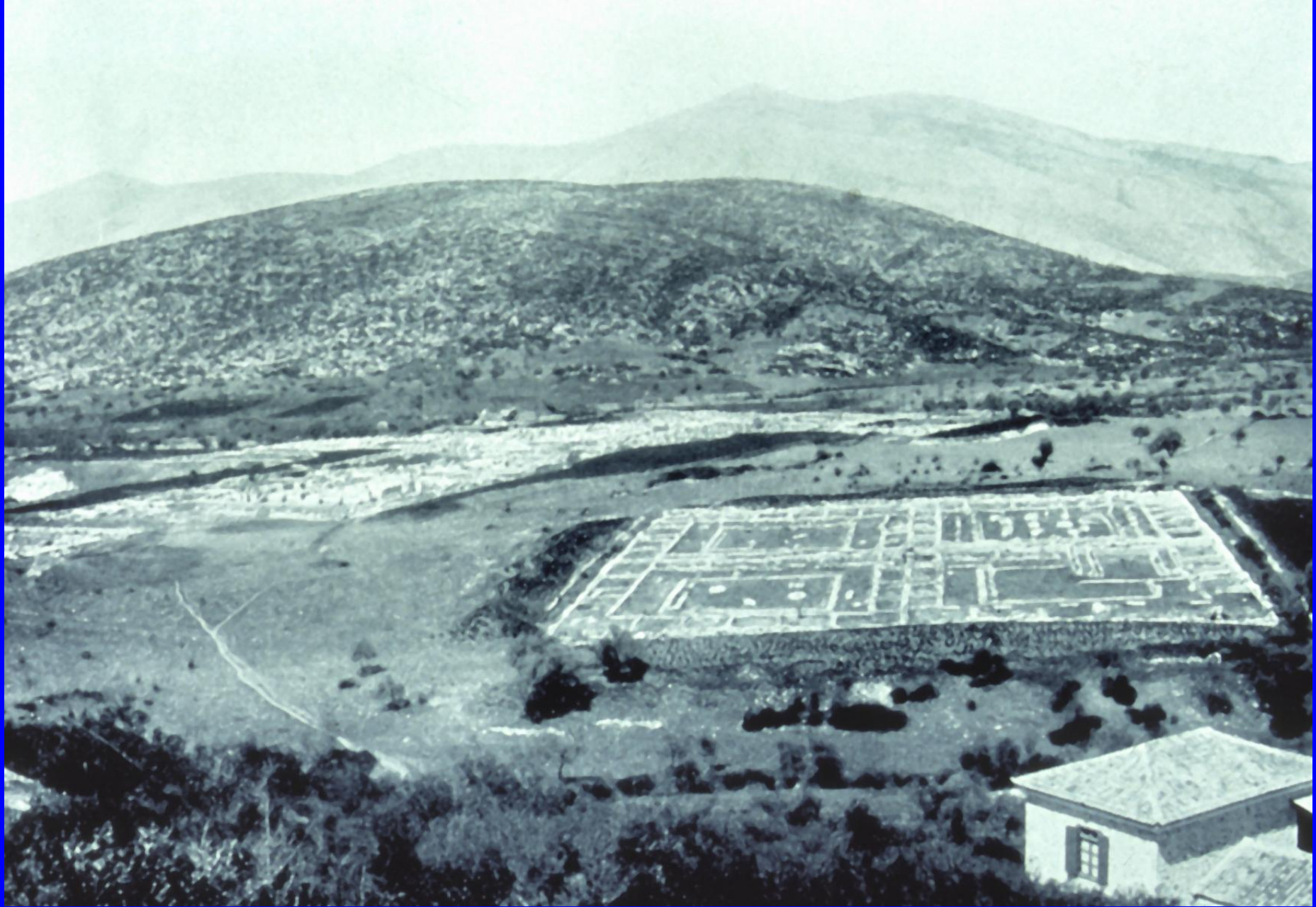

Reconstruction of the Asklepieion of Epidauros

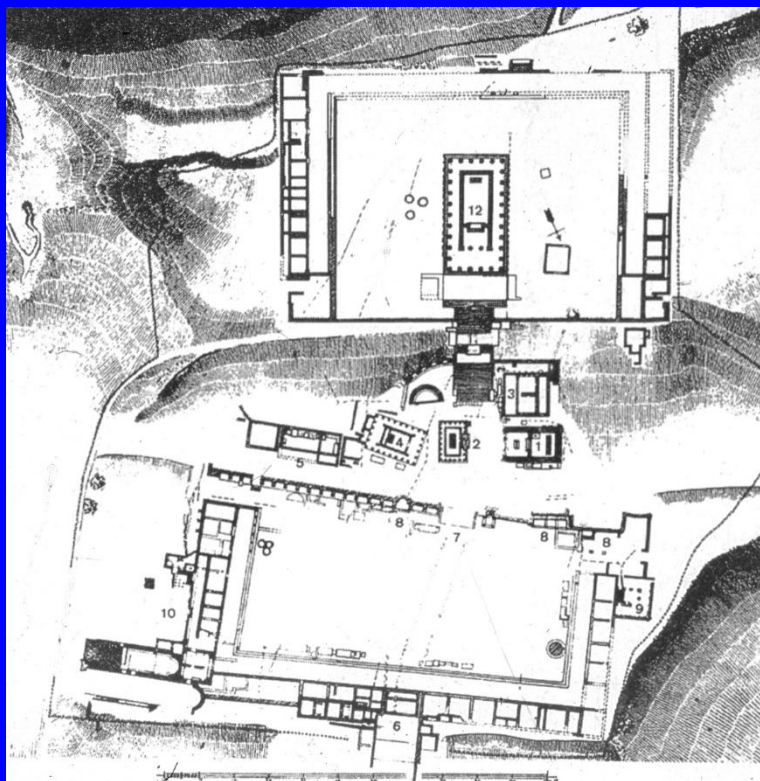
